**Soil Your Undies Campaign**

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**National Soil Conservation Week** happens during the third week of April each year. It is a perfect opportunity for Canadians to highlight the importance of soil health and soil science to our economy and our future. This year, from April 21-27, 2019, the Soil Conservation Council of Canada invites you to get involved by performing the *Soil Your Undies challenge*. It is a fun and simple soil science experiment that tests one of the indicators of soil health – its biological activity.

#### Why is soil health important?

Soil produces 95% of the food we eat. Soil is a living breathing system that provides nutrients and water to crops as well as homes to billions of soil organisms. These organisms feed growing crops by turning dead plant material into useable nutrients. They also help create soil organic matter, which holds water and reduces the risk of soil erosion.

Even though healthy soil is critical to the economic and environmental sustainability of the agri-food industry, it is increasingly under stress. These stresses include:

- the expansion of our cities and communities;
- increased demands on soils to grow food for growing populations;
- changes in cropping, tillage and other practices that can degrade soil health; and
- increased frequency of extreme weather due to climate change, which can speed up soil degradation.

The annual cost of soil degradation in Canada is estimated at over \$3 billion each and every year, and this will only increase if nothing is done.

**So what can we do?** Farmers and land managers need support to implement best management practices that mitigate many of these risks, but it is not solely their responsibility. Every Canadian that enjoys the abundance of safe and nutritious food should be aware of the threats to our soil and support the conservation of this precious resource. Be vocal and share your concern for Canada's soil health through social media and with your local industry/community group or politician.

#### What is Soil Your Undies?

Soil Your Undies was initiated by the Innovative Farmers Association of Ontario. The Soil Conservation Council of Canada gives this project a national perspective.

As part of National Soil Conservation Week 2019, the Soil Conservation Council of Canada encourages the Canadian public to take part in the Soil Your Undies challenge. Soil Your Undies is a fun soil science experiment that investigates biological activity in farm fields, backyard gardens or anywhere soil is found.



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#### What to do

Bury a pair of 100 per cent white cotton underwear in 15 cm of topsoil. Mark the spot and come back in about two months. Carefully dig the undies out and examine the state of decomposition of the cotton. If there's not much left of the underwear you have good biological activity, which is one indicator of healthy soil. If the underwear looks nearly intact, with little decomposition, this may mean your soil is lacking something. Your Soil Your Undies experiment can start any time before mid-summer, but it is best to get started in the spring. #### What you'll need

- New pair of white 100% cotton briefs (no dyes or polyester blends)
- Shovel
- Marker flag

#### Now get to it

- Dig a narrow trench and bury the underwear in the top 15 cm of soil
- Leave the waistband showing a little and mark the place with a flag so you'll be able to find it again
- Leave the underwear buried for about two months
- Dig it up carefully and wash it in a bucket of water to remove the soil

#### **Compare soil management practices**

- Test similar soil types under different rotations and tillage management
- Keep track of each pair by writing an identifying number on the waistband
- Bury all underwear being compared on the same day and for the same amount of time

#### **Community Engagement**

To help our message make an impact, the Soil Conservation Council of Canada invites you to join the Soil Your Undies challenge by organizing your own event. By doing this, your organization gains handson learning on soil health and you can help keep soil health top-of-mind by sharing your experience with your networks.

There are many ways to increase public awareness and get your community involved in soil health events. Here are some suggestions:

#### **Community Centres**

Work with your local community centre today! Sponsor a community Soil Your Undies event where kids and program leaders can come together and bury underwear in a designated area on the centre's grounds.



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This is a great way to introduce new generations to the importance of soil conservation, and teach them about soil health in a fun, interactive way.

#### **Community gardens**

Community gardens have popped up in cities across the country. Host a Soil Your Undies party in a community garden near you and test the biological activity of the soil. You could even have a competition between community gardens and offer a prize for the most decomposed pair of undies.

#### **School groups**

Why not bring soil health to today's youth? Students are always learning and subconsciously hungry for more information. Bring Soil Your Undies to the classroom and create a conversation around soil health in a tangible and interactive way. What kid doesn't like playing in the dirt?

#### **Team building**

Not sure what to do for a fun team building exercise with your staff or coworkers? Need to get out of the office on a nice spring day? Why not organize Soil Your Undies challenge for your workplace? Give everyone a pair of 100% cotton underwear and spend a few minutes outside. It's a great way to create a conversation around soil health throughout the office.
